COMMODORE'S COMMENTS

Spring has definitely arrived on the Chesapeake. Flowers are blooming, boats are launching and our Cruising, Racing and Junior Fleet activities are beginning. Watch The Old Man and our web page (http://mrsa.sailnet.com) for details.

The Volvo Ocean Race is in town, bringing international attention to Baltimore, Annapolis and the Chesapeake. They encountered clear skies, warm temperatures and light winds for their trip up the Bay — conditions more typical in July or August. Let's hope that the spring breezes return for the restart.

On a more somber note, there was an incident at a recent multihull championship that cost a sailor his life. As is typical in situations like this, there were many factors that lead to the tragedy – things that, if done differently, could have easily changed the outcome. The sailor was wearing a trapeze harness without a quick release buckle and was not carrying a knife. When the boat capsized, he became entangled and drowned. Don't think that a similar situation can't happen here. A few years ago a sailor was lost during the Governor's Cup. Last summer a couple narrowly avoided tragedy when they encountered a freighter near the Bay Bridge. I've witnessed two man-overboard drills during our Wednesday Night Races — one of which is the basis for our May Membership Meeting program. This is the time to plan for a safe season — think about how to prevent and respond to these types of situations.

Let's be safe so that we can all continue to enjoy our sport.

WHATEVER HAP-PENED TO THE SPEED LIMIT PROPOSAL FOR THE MAGOTHY?

In late 2000 a petition was initiated by MRSA member Bill Adler, to extend the "No Wake" zone that already exist on the creeks that feed into the Magothy on its western end, [Mill, Cypress, Upper Magothy], to a line that would extend between North Ferry Point marker Red "12", to South Ferry Point marker Green "11". from 6AM to 9AM seven days a week. The purpose of the petition was to provide canoers, kayakers, rowed dories and recreational shells an opportunity to enjoy the River without threat of swamping or capsize from large powerboat wakes generated by high speeds. Forty-four individuals, according to the Department of Natural Resources, signed the petition.

In the spring of 2001, floats announcing the proposal were placed at various places in the river and creeks, requesting comments and providing a phone number for the Natural Resources Police. A hearing on the proposal was held in October, 2001, where the Boat Act Advisory Committee would make recommendations to the DNR. Bill Adler, Tom Condon and Fred Betz attended the hearing. [Many other proposals were also scheduled to be heard, and there were many other interested parties in attendance.] The DNR's subsidiary organization, the NRP reported their survey results: Phone Comments: 9 for, 86 against; Written Comments: 29 for 56 against; Field continued next column

Speed Limit Proposal continued from previous column

Survey: no activity of small boats seen; NRP Officer Survey: area frequently used by skiers during this time. The area is unprotected form weather, ... unsuitable for small rowed vessels.

The DNR recommended not changing the existing speed limits. They also recommended improving its educational programs to include more information about wake responsibility around small boats. The Boat Act Advisory Committee, consisting of representatives for Watermen, Water Skiing, Marinas, Power Boaters, Crabbers, and perhaps an Environmental group, heard the testimony, asked a few questions, and went on to the next topic. No recreational user of the waters that don't depend primarily on marine engines, has a seat on the Committee; no sailing group, no rowing or canoeing or kayaking groups; none.

What was obvious was that the DNR was against every single grass roots proposal heard that day and all of which concerned the speed and behavior of motor boat operators. The BAC ruled against any and all proposals that would limit extending speed reduction areas, even by 100 yards! This was not surprising, after seeing the affiliations of the Boat Act Advisory Committee, and in the end they concurred with all DNR recommendations which was to do nothing that would limit motor boat activities. On top of that there was a feeling expressed by the BAC that small rowed boats may constitute a hazard on the river since they may interfere with motor driven craft. With a Committee almost totally powerboat oriented, and the DNR against all citizen requests, we received a judgement which was inevitable. Petition Denied!

WHAT IS THE CBYRA?

The Chesapeake Bay Yacht Racing Association (CBYRA) is an organization comprised of over 75 member clubs, more than 50 classes of racing sailboats, and over 1800 individual members from Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, New Jersey, and North Carolina. CBYRA represents these clubs, classes and individual members to US Sailing. CBYRA is the fourth largest such Association in US Sailing.

CBYRA was founded in 1914 to promote fair yachting competition by supporting standard yacht racing and measurement rules and by coordinating racing schedules and regattas for the Chesapeake Bay area. These functions are still central to CBYRA's tasks. CBYRA also provides an appellate function for protests for all sailing events in the Chesapeake Bay area.


CBYRA has a professional staff in the form of an Executive Assistant who runs the CBYRA office, handles numerous member service tasks, and provides a continuous review of the progress of volunteer efforts being run out of the CBYRA office. Volunteers who serve on the Executive Committee, run the various other committees, or help perform member services such as putting together the CBYRA Race Weeks in the Northern Bay, Southern Bay, and Annapolis do the rest of the work of CBYRA.

As a member of CBYRA, MRSA receives the following services:

- ·Club competitions at the YRA level, some leading to national competition.
- ·A voice in government affairs affecting yachtsmen at the federal and local levels through CBYRA membership in, and cooperation with, US Sailing and other groups.
 - ·Bay-wide system of training for juniors in basic sailing and racing.
 - ·Race Management Seminar to improve race committee skills



As announced in the April Old Man, the MRSA has purchased 4 newer 420's to invigorate our ailing Junior Training fleet. What this means to the quality of the program we can offer our Junior Skippers and crew is the ability to fast forward about 20 years from the older International 420's, some of which date back to the mid-sixty's. This is great news for our juniors but has made the off-season storage area at Wes and Sheryl McNair's somewhat congested.

There are currently five older 420's that MRSA intends to cull from our fleet and are now available to MRSA members. They range in condition from moderately sailable to needing various amounts of work. With some degree of proficiency using West System, most can be repaired and could make excellent trainers for youngsters eager and willing to learn. Donations for the reasonable worth of the boats would be appreciated, and would help support the improvement of the fleet.
