
Take a Thursday off on October 16th and enjoy a day on the Bay. You will have a wonderful panorama of sails that day when the annual Great Schooner Race from Baltimore to Portsmouth, Virginia starts just below the Bay Bridge.

If the weather cooperates, it is often a wonderful day for a fall picnic on the water. Pack a sandwich and a beverage and bring your camera. There will be hundreds of others out to see the parade of schooners from Baltimore harbor to below the Bridge. The Pride of Baltimore participates, as well as the Virginia, Lady Maryland, Mystic Whaler, and the Amistad, all over 100 feet in length, and fifteen other schooners over 50 feet long. There will be at least fifty schooners sailing to Virginia. It really is a beautiful sight.

The race starts at 1:00 PM and Ed and Peggy Poe will be sailing there on Ravenous. If you would like to join us give us a call at 410-296-6428 and come along. Or take your boat and we'll see you out there.

### September Cruise Wrap-Up

The September cruise was the week in September when there were 3 tropical storms/hurricanes in the Atlantic. After delaying the start of the cruise one day so that Tropical Storm Hanna could leave the mid-Atlantic area, 3 boats set out for a week's

cruise. The only plan was to meet in Annapolis and then we would decide where to go on a daily basis.

George and Gail Braun, Mike and Loura Bonham and Debbie and John Lund met in Annapolis. The moorings were empty because of the "Hanna" so we had the pick of the harbor. It is always interesting to watch the people and boats navigate the harbor. The decision was made to go to Swan Creek on Monday and Worton Creek on Tuesday. The wind was to blow out of the Southeast for 2 days. At Worton Creek, there would be no jellyfish and hopefully the barnacles could be cleaned from the props.

Monday was light air but when there are no wakes and it isn't 90 degrees you tend to try to sail. The Brauns had friends on a Swan that joined us in Swan Creek. They were able to navigate the creek drawing 7 ½ feet of water! The weather forecast for Tuesday issued a small craft advisory and predicted thunderstorms so we decided to stay in Swan Creek. So much for the clean bottoms! The weather wasn't too bad so we walked around Rock Hall. After Labor Day, most of the stores were closed on Mondays and Tuesdays. The ice cream store was open. We had dinner at the Swan Creek Inn.

On Wednesday, the Lunds, Brauns, and Bonhams headed toward St. Michaels. I never knew there was an area of shallow water near the high bridge until George and Gail are following us and ran aground in the channel. There is a small blue dot on the chart. We were joined by the Maisees and rafted-up in Leeds Creek. This creek is across the Miles River from St. Michaels. The entrance is tricky--don't go too close to the Green marker #1. Once inside the creek, there is plenty of water and we were the only boats in the creek.

On Thursday, we motored across the river to St. Michaels. During the day, we anchored in the harbor so we could venture to town. We contacted the Fones and decided to go to the Miles River Yacht Club for dinner. Late in the afternoon, we pulled up anchor and motored to Longhaul Creek. The Poes sailed from the Magothy on Thursday so there were 12 people for dinner at the Yacht Club. It is a great place to have dinner and MRSA does have reciprocity with the club. Next year, MRSA will have to plan a cruise to the Miles River Yacht Club.

On Friday the Brauns and Maisees sailed back to the Magothy. They had a great trip as it was blowing out of the south. The Lunds, Poes and Bonhams sailed to Granary Creek/Wye River.
