

Commodore Comments – Goose Cruise ... and Volunteer

Sadly, this was the first cruise without Honey, wonder dog of the Lund's. Honey was truly a leading MRSA cruiser for many years, and will be surely missed by us all.

Sunday we all awoke to another beautiful day, and lighter (read: more appropriate for sailing) winds. Driving directions to the Podickory Point Marina:

<u>Choice A:</u> Take Ritchie Highway (RT 2) to College Parkway. Proceed to the end of College Parkway, straight through the light at Cape Saint Claire Road and onto East College Parkway. Continue on East College Parkway past the 7-11 and the PNC Bank to parallel RT 50/301 about 2 miles to turn left at Log Inn Road.

- Go straight on Log Inn Road (changes name to Tydings Road) a little over one mile. (Watch for deer!) Turn right on Bay Front Terrace and continue about a quarter mile. Turn right at the sign/gate for Podickory Point Marina. Park in any unreserved spot, go to the clubhouse, and enjoy the view of Baltimore and Sandy Point Lights – and the Bay Bridge.

<u>Choice B:</u> Take RT 50/301 toward the Bay Bridge. Take the last exit before the toll: Exit 32. Turn left at the end of the ramp to cross over RT 50/301. Turn Left on East College Parkway and go about a quarter mile to right on Log Inn Road. (Then follow Log Inn Road directions above.)



Smuggling Captain Nathaniel Harte joins high-spirited Anne Easton for a daring rescue attempt in Jamaica, where

the pirate Deadlight Helms, heroic Windward Maroons, a foul-mouthed parrot, Obeah magic, a corrupt governor, and the relentless Royal Navy make for swashbuckling adventure.

The first shots of the American Revolution were fired by the British Navy at colonial smugglers, long before the skirmishes at Lexington and Concord.

In 1763 the instructions to Captain Walter Stirling of the Royal Navy frigate *Rainbow,* on station from Cape Henlopen to Cape Henry, were to guard the coast and secure trade against "pirates and others." Since there had been precious few "pirates" in American waters since 1724, this meant the Royal Navy had open season on colonial smugglers.

"This insurrection is composed of great numbers of Sailors headed by Captains of Privateers, and other Ships; Inhabitants of the Town joined by many who come in from the Neighboring Country and Provinces..." – General Gage, dispatch to London from New York, November 4, 1765

A quick reviewer's comment: "This story of a Chesapeake Sea Captain operating under the nose, and sometimes under the guns of the British Navy, is a great story that is both historically and technically accurate. Great read; couldn't put it down and can't wait for the next part of this tale!"

"We were (and still are) members of the MRSA for 15+ years, cruising and hosting cruises aboard *Niche*, a Catalina/Morgan 454. We hosted several memorable Goose Cruises with pirates and jellyfish swarming the decks. Many people remember our double-ended rowing dory we used as a tender (my design and build). *Niche* is now for sale, and we are temporarily inactive members.

"I have been a student of boat design, American small craft and sailing ships, and a boat builder for over 40 years, and have designed and built many small craft. As I learned the history of the development of American sailing vessels, I found the stories behind the ships fascinating. I did years of research into the colonial era, not only the ships; but the details of the everyday life of the common people. Those are the characters in my historical novel *Jack's Favorite*; everyday common folk who did extraordinary things in the course of their lives.

"Of course learning to write a good story is a craft in itself. After years of consulting for the World Bank and writing environmental reports, I figured I should strike out on my own to combine writing with my avocation.

"I had a lot of help along the way, not the least of which came from MRSA members. My sailing and well-read friends Chuck Beck and Jeff Fones gave much of their time and provided wonderful advice.

Racing Corner

PHRF of the Chesapeake Annual Meeting Saturday, 20 November 2010, at the Annapolis Yacht Club

The PHRF of the Chesapeake annual meeting is coming up; this year there are a couple of game-changing proposals to be considered. I'll summarize them, but also encourage you to read the full proposals at http://www.phrfchesbay.com/annmtg2010agdaltr.pdf .

1. Lower the renewal fees by \$5. Costs are down, and the organization is in solid financial shape. Should be a slam-dunk.

2. Class splits (for Sanctioned Events -- the 'Bay' races). <110 A, 110-145 B, 145> C. Current is <116 A, 116-154 B, 154> C.....moving a few boats on the borders. Bumble Bee becomes an A boat is the only change that I see in the Magothy-based boats. No strong opinion here.

3. Non-spinnaker ratings. All boats are given ratings based on their performance using spinnakers. When some (say an Antrim 27, with a small jib) participate in a non-spinnaker class, their performance relative to other boats (say a J/35, with a 155% genoa) changes....but their ratings do not. This proposal would establish NS ratings to even out this inequity -- a rating that would be used when the boat competes in a NS class. I'm in favor in principle, but concerned about some of the details. (Will the Handicappers be forced to rate all 1,000+ boats before April?)

4. Close a loophole in the rules regarding mizzen staysails. I doubt that there will be much discussion.....

5. Region 1 wants to add Gov Cup, Solomons, St. Michael's and the August Oxford races as Wild Cards. I'm leaning against it -- there are already four Wild Card events, and Region 1 and Region 2 (us) can use each other's races as High Point qualifiers.

6. Clarifying equipment level requirements for sanctioned races, probably just for the Southern Bay. If that's what they want, I'll support it.

7. Southern Bay proposal to eliminate the CBYRA membership requirement to qualify for High Point. I'm against -- because it isn't our requirement to remove. High Point is a CBYRA award, and they set the requirements....including mandatory membership. Take it up with the CBYRA representatives, not PHRF.

8. The big one. There is Annapolis-based pressure to reduce the number of High Point events. Proponents

believe that reducing the number will increase participation in the races that remain (probable), and increase participation in the races that are no longer High Point events (this I question) -- by opening the races up to other classes and less serious participants. The proposal is to put the scheduling into the hands of a committee that would choose a limited number of events and prevent schedule conflicts. (Side note: as it is defined in the proposal, I'd be on that committee.) I'm concerned that the geographical area is too broad (Solomon's and Middle River couldn't hold High Point events on the same weekend!), is being implemented quickly (the 2011 schedule is already set, so clubs have lost the opportunity to move events a week or two), and may not have been completely thought through.

9 & 10. Election of Officers and Appointments. Slam-dunk, except that the Southern Bay needs someone to step forward and be their VP.

I recently attended a showing of *Superman 3* here at LSA Anaconda in a large auditorium. As is the custom at all military bases, we stood to attention when the National Anthem began before the main feature. (For those who are unaware, at all military base theaters, the National Anthem is played before the movie begins.) All was going well until three-quarters of the way through The National Anthem, the music stopped.

Now, what would happen if this occurred with 1,000 18-22 year-olds back in the States? I imagine there would be hoots, catcalls, laughter, a few rude comments, and everyone would sit down and yell for the movie to begin. Of course, that is, if they had stood for the National Anthem in the first place.

Here in Iraq, 1,000 Soldiers continued to stand at attention, eyes fixed forward. The music started again and the Soldiers continued to quietly stand at attention. But again, at the same point, the music stopped. What would you expect 1000 Soldiers standing at attention to do?? Frankly, I expected some laughter, and everyone would eventually sit down and wait for the movie to start. But No!!... You could have heard a pin drop, while every Soldier continued to stand at attention.

Suddenly, there was a lone voice from the front of the auditorium, then a dozen voices, and soon the room was filled with the voices of a thousand soldiers, finishing where the recording left off:

"...and the rockets' red glare, the bombs bursting in air, gave proof through the night that our flag was still there. Oh, say does that Star Spangled Banner yet wave, o'er the land of the free, and the home of the brave."

It was the most inspiring moment I have had in Iraq and I wanted you to know what kind of Soldiers are serving you. Enjoy your Veterans Day Holiday.
