Commodore's Comments - Favorite Bay Cruising Places

Many of our MRSA members have spent a lot of time cruising the Chesapeake Bay. All of us cruisers spend time in a variety of gunk holes, rivers, creeks, towns and cities that abound around the Bay. I find it hard to say that any one place is my favorite. Almost all destinations are enjoyable and offer a wide variety of activities to fit the mood of the day. Here are some I really enjoy visiting:

Dividing Creek off the Wye River. This creek offers solitude, at least on weekdays. I'm fond of anchoring in the small, but deep, cove to the west just after you enter the creek. Evenings are a great time to watch the wild life along the shore.

Turner Creek off the Sassafras River. A bit challenging to get into, but once inside the creek offers a good anchorage, shelter, great scenery, and on shore a county park awaits you. Road out a storm in Turner Creek once and was fascinated watching the watermen load their catch of live eels into a tank-truck for shipment to Japan. Watermen told me that the Japanese love to eat the ugly Chesapeake eels.

St. Michaels. Who doesn't love to visit this town? Being a member of the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum, I always try to get a slip at the Museum dock. They have showers and it's fun to explore the museum grounds. A visit to St. Michaels would not be complete without lunch or dinner at the famous Crab Claw Restaurant.

Oxford. Another great town to visit. If you are lucky you may find an anchorage in Town Creek. Oxford has several good restaurants, but save room for desert. Scottish Highlands is acclaimed for having the best ice cream on the Eastern Shore.

Solomons. If you are headed down the Bay or back to the Magothy from Virginia shores, Solomon's Island is a convenient port of call. All kinds of provisions are available, and boat repairs done quickly and expertly at Zahniser's yard have salvaged several of my vacation trips.

During the War of 1812, a British Squadron trapped a U.S. barge fleet lead by Commodore Joshua Barney in the creek. Barney was able to break out of the creek and move his barges up the river where they were scuttled and remain today. When I'm anchored in St. Leonard Creek I always think about Barney and his sailors.

I could go on, but, for those MRSA members who don't cruise regularly, I hope I have awakened your interest in visiting some of the wonderful places on the Bay. This month MRSA boats will cruise to the Choptank River and Oxford, Eagle Cove on the Magothy, and the Corsica River. Why not join in?

Celebrate the 4th of July Weekend with MRSA July 2-3-4

Some charts indicate that it is difficult to get into the Cove; however, there is plenty of water and it is not a problem.
