

Sunday Brunch at Church Creek, South River September 20,21

The cruise for September 20th and 21st will be to Church Creek. Church Creek is located on the north shore of the South River and the homeport for *Fantastic*. Plan to arrive by 1700 hours to enjoy happy hour ashore at the Wilelinor Community beachfront. Bring an hors d'oeuvre to share as well as your liquid refreshments. In case of inclement weather, happy hour will be in the community pavilion adjacent to the marina and beach area. Sunday morning, Rich and Toni will host a brunch at their home. If you can't come by boat, plan to arrive by land yacht and enjoy a weekend on the South River. Brunch will start at 0900 hours for the cruisers; land cruiser arrive any time after 0900 hours. Local Knowledge for Church Creek on the South River

Once you enter the South River, continue to day marker Red 12. The Day marker 14, the previous turning mark into Church has been removed. If you would like to put a waypoint in your chart plotter where R14 used to be, the coordinates were Lat 38° 56.7' N, Long 076° 32.0' W. The entrance to Church Creek will be at a heading of 340 from the R14 location. There is a community marina at the entrance to the creek that is visible from midriver. Begin a sweeping right turn toward the marina that is visible. As you approach the entrance to the creek, you will see a speed marker at the entrance to the creek. You should be in 12-14 feet of water. As you approach the speed marker, the better water is to the right side. Once inside the marker, stay to the center of the creek. Continue up the creek.

On the right side just beyond the second pier, you will see a wooden bulkhead. Be sure that you are at least two boat lengths off the bulkhead. Beyond the bulkhead on the left will be a speed marker on the left side along the shore with marsh grass behind the marker. There is a shoal extending two to three boat lengths from the speed marker.

Beyond the speed marker, continue in the center of the creek. Looking ahead, you will see a house with bright yellow awnings. The community marina is on the point to the right of the house with the yellow awnings. Off the point, the creek narrows past a speed marker on a pilling. Anchor in the creek before the speed marker. There are pilings about 20 yards off the shore in front of the community area. The floating dingy dock is inside the pillings.

Directions by land yacht to the Church Creek Cruise.

Take Ritchie Highway south to Route 50 West. Follow Route 50 west to the exit (Exit 22) for Aris Allen Boulevard (Route 665). Exit Route 665 at Solomon's Island Road (Route 2). From the exit ramp continue straight across route 2 into the community of Wilelinor. As you are facing Christ Church, turn right onto Grand Oak. Proceed to the stop sign. Turn left on to Wilelinor Drive. Follow Wilelinor Drive until it curves to the left. As Wilelinor Drive turns to the right, continue onto Carvel Circle. The tan house with red shutters on the left (11 Carvel Circle) is the Hughes'. Please park at the Hughes' house and walk down Wilelinor Drive to the end (one long block) to reach the marina.

Potapskut Sailing Association is pleased to announce their Second annual Race to Rock Hall scheduled for September 27, 2014. The race format invites participation from 10 sailing classes using CBYRA Region II government marks. The course is expected to be 15 NM and will be set by the race committee the day of the race.

Baltimore Light will serve as the starting mark with a finish on the Eastern Shore near Rock Hall. There will be an on-shore social following the race at Haven Harbour Marina in Swan Creek. The inaugural event attracted 42 participants with two one-design classes. This year, two additional one-design fleets have been added anticipating as many as 65 to 70 race entries. PSA will also host a Sunday Race back to Baltimore Light.
