It has been a very difficult season for me so far in relation to getting my boat in the water. But, I am very close. I always like to begin the boating season by asking everyone to think of safety and equipment. This year will be no different. Have you ever been boarded by the Coast Guard or Marine Police? Do you feel that you have been boarded excessively? A cure might be getting a Vessel Safety Check. The VSC sticker shows that of date your vessel was inspected you were in complete compliance with all safety areas. Getting the inspection and sticker is not a guarantee that you won't get boarded, but it should help. Because of the high number of water related fatalities in 2015, I believe we may see more boarding for this upcoming boating season. The inspections are completed by the US Coast Guard Auxiliary or the US Power Squadrons for free. If you go to the Auxiliary's web site for inspections, http://wow.uscgaux.info/content.php?unit=V-DEPT, an inspection can be scheduled, items

normally missed on an inspection are listed, and the inspection items are explained. Who knows, you may even save some money on your boat insurance when you pass an inspection. Check with your insurance agent.

Take a look at The Day Mark. We are only half way through the dates, and there are still plenty of activities left to attend, including the PSA Moonlight Race, the June Picnic at the Poulsen's, Summer Solstice Cruise, 1st Wednesday Night Racing Social, and Junior Training Boat Prep and that's only up to the end of June. There is something for everyone to attend. As they say, Make Some Memories, and have some fun.

The annual MRSA June picnic is coming up on Saturday, June 11! The picnic will be held at our home at 20 Wardour Drive in Annapolis from 5 PM until whenever. If you come by boat, anchorage is available in Weems Creek, just northwest of our dock; if you are early and lucky, you might be able to pick up one of the free Navy moorings. Take your dinghy around the corner towards Annapolis and pull up on the beach next to the dock where Blue Moon is moored (38°59'51.00 N, 76°29'45.00 W), or go around the point and pull up onto the beach at Horseshoe Bay. It is a short walk along the fence up to the house. By land yacht, take Rowe Boulevard off of Rt. 50 towards Annapolis, turn left onto Melvin Avenue at the first major intersection with a traffic light, and continue to the end, bearing slight right at Wardour circle. We are the last house on the right just before the old wooden railroad bridge. If you drive into the Severn River, you have gone too far. Parking is available on the street.

Bay Bites

Bay bites is a new addition to the "*Old Man*" of tasty treats that can be made on a boat. I know we all love our boats and enjoy eating, so, dig up your favorite boat recipe from your galley to share with the MRSA members Please send your recipe to newsletter@magothysailing.com, and I will publish it in Bay Bites.

I have a recipe that would be really quick and easy for dinner-Montreal Chicken, Couscous and Tomato Salad. It will serve a family of 4 (or 3 if you have a really hungry teenager).

Ingredients:

4 boneless chicken breasts, cut into bite size pieces (the smaller the pieces, the quicker it will cook)

1 pkg. McCormick's Montreal Chicken seasoning marinade (additional ingredients will be water, oil and vinegar)

1-1/4 c water

1 c couscous

5-6 large Roma tomatoes cut into chunks

- $\frac{1}{2}$ red onion sliced in long thin pieces
- 1 c shredded Mozzarella cheese (either fresh grated or packaged is fine)

3-4 fresh Basil leaves chopped rough

Your favorite oil-based dressing--I use Ken's Light Caesar or Balsamic Vinaigrette

The key to this meal is preparation prior to departure. The night before departure:

- · Make Montreal Chicken marinade and place in gallon size Ziploc bag
- Place the diced chicken in the marinade
- · Assemble salad ingredients and lightly toss with dressing. Place in separate Ziploc bag
- So, you should have 2 things marinating overnight in separate bags--chicken and salad**
- Prep boat and place these items in the icebox and refrigerate all day
- · Go have fun sailing
- · When you get hungry, sauté chicken in skillet
- At roughly the same time, boil water in medium saucepan
- Add couscous to boiling water. Put lid on it, take off heat and let it sit until ready to serve (it needs to sit unattended for at least 5 minutes)
- Put salad ingredients in bowl and serve
- · Fluff couscous and place in bowl
- When chicken is cooked through, place in bowl, serve, and enjoy

**Hint-there is nothing worse than a Ziploc bag that leaks. Double bag the chicken--put the top of one bag in the bottom of the other.
