Commodore's Comments



A couple of weeks ago, I took part in one of the annual rites of Fall – I went to the Sailboat Show. I hate to admit that I think this was my 42nd time, since I still get excited as I walk down Main Street and look at the

tents, flags and banners in the harbor. It almost looks like a medieval festival come to Annapolis. And in a way, it is medieval – 1000 years ago people were sailing. They certainly were not driving cars, running powerboats, taking trains, or flying (at least not intentionally). So why has sailing, this slow and impractical mode of transportation, stayed so popular?



I ponder that as I winch up my 90 pound mainsail. Why not get a powerboat? Just get in, turn the key, push that lever forward, and get to where you want to go quickly, stay dry, sit in comfort, and not be so subject to the vagaries of nature. my patience with the lack of wind holds out). But then I think of the wonderful feeling of being on a close reach in 14 knots of wind, with the boat steering herself, slicing through the water in a way that is almost sensuous. Sigh... I guess I'll be sailing a little bit longer.

This year's sailing season also has just a little bit longer to go. Racing is pretty much over, but there is still the Frostbite Cruise on October 26-27

(probably completed by the time you read this). And for me, there is one additional cruise, the aptly named Welldigger's Cruise (from the saying "Cold as a Weddigger's a— at 40 feet") that has now taken place 32 times in November and once in December (never again!), ending sadly with a haulout at Oak Harbor.

So, now that the sailing season is coming to an end, there isn't much else to do with MRSA, right? Well, not quite, since we need to complete one more important task – select the club officers for next year. This is a chance for all those who participate in the club's activities to give back a little. There are a number of critical positions open (rest assured you will get emails about them), and I want to encourage members who have not taken part in running the club to consider taking one of them. You would get a lot of assistance from the previous officers, and find in fact that it is not too difficult or time consuming, and can be both rewarding and fun. See you on the water one last time!
